UK guideline for the management of vulval conditions 2014 has been published by The British Association of Sexual Health and HIV. To view the guidelines please see the attached document below.

This guideline offers recommendations on the diagnostic tests and treatment regimens needed for the effective management of the following vulval conditions:

- Vulval lichen sclerosus
- Vulval lichen planus
- Vulval eczema
- Vulval lichen simplex
- Vulval psoriasis
- Vulval intraepithelial neoplasia
- Vulval pain syndromes



The Poppy Trail

The female pelvic floor is a frequent source of trouble, especially for those who have undergone the indignities of childbirth and are approaching the indignities of old age. The British POPPY trial attempted to assess the effect of pelvic floor exercises for reducing the symptoms of prolapse: women received one-to-one instruction and support from a physiotherapist, and the primary endpoint was participants' self-report of prolapse symptoms at 12 months, reducing the rate of surgical referral in the intervention group by half.

Esmya

The SPC for Esmya was updated in January 2014 allowing a 3 month course of treatment to be repeated once in women who require a further course of pre-operative treatment for their moderate to severe fibroids. Treatment is restricted to 2 courses only because of the lack of long-term safety data.

Sexual and Reproductive Health Profiles Tool

PHE launched the Sexual and Reproductive Health Profiles earlier this week. The tool is designed to support local authorities, public health leads and others with an interest in this area to monitor the sexual and reproductive health (SRH) of their population and the contribution of local public health related systems. The Profiles provide data as interactive maps, charts and tables, across a range of topics, such as teenage pregnancy, abortion, contraception, HIV, sexually transmitted infections and sexual offences. Wider influences on SRH are also included such as alcohol use, education and deprivation levels. In addition to the SRH profiles tool, PHE also published a guide to national and local SRH data and under 18 conception rate forecasts up to 2020.


